#### July 1st Turtle Island/Canada Canada Day

#### July 3rd Buddhism Asalha Puja

This is a celebration amongst the Theravada Buddhist community, (Indonesia, Thailand, Myanmar, Cambodia, Sri Lanka and Laos) of the first sermon by the Buddha following his enlightenment. It is one of the most important celebrations in the Buddhist Community.

#### July 4th America Independence Day

Marks the Declaration of Independence signed on July 4, 1776 after the original 13 colonies now known as the United States of America gained independence from Britain.

#### July 9th Baha'i Martyrdom of the Báb

An observation to commemorate the execution of the Báb (founder of the Baha'i faith) in 1850, as ordered by the Persian Empire.

This day in 1789 marked the start of the French Revolution after the storming of a prison in Paris known as the Bastille, which held a number of political prisoners.

## July 14th Global International Non-Binary People's Day

A day to raise awareness of the difficulties faced by nonbinary people.

## July 18th Global Nelson Mandela International Day

The U.N. General Assembly announced this day in 2009 to recognize Nelson Mandela's speech and call to young people to take leadership and address the world's social injustices. It is also Nelson Mandela's birthday

#### July 19 - 20th Islam Hijri New Year

Islamic New Year. It is the year 1443. Islam is the youngest religion of all the major religions and the fastest growing religion in the world. Happy New Year to everyone who celebrates.

#### July 26 - 27th Jewish Tisha B'Av

Tisha B'Av is the end of a three week period which marks the destruction of two sacred temples by the Babylonians and the Romans. To commemorate the loss, the Jewish community offer prayer by reading select passages from the Torah and fast on the 9th Av.
