### Feb 1st American National Freedom Day

In 1865, Abraham Lincoln signed the 13th Amendment to the U.S. Constitution, which outlawed slavery. In commemoration of the signing, Richard Write, a former slave, founded National Freedom Day.

### Feb 3rd Japan Setsubun-Sai (Beginning of Spring)

A celebration acknowledging the beginning of Spring in Japan. Some customs include dressing up as ogres or devils to scare away evil spirits. There are many different traditions in celebrating this holiday, depending on the region in Japan

### Feb 10th Chinese Lantern Festival

This is the first significant holiday, marking the last day of the Chinese New Year celebrations.

Beautiful and decorative Chinese lanterns illuminate the sky during the night of the event.

### Feb 2nd Groundhog Day US and Canada

Groundhog day is a folklore derived from people who worshiped animals and nature. They believed that groundhogs or similar burrowing animals could predict the weather. If the groundhog sees its shadow, winter will be prolonged for another six weeks!

### Feb 7-8th Islam Lailat ul Mihraj

This was the night when the instructions for the 5 daily prayers was revealed to the Prophet Mohammed in Jerusalem. The day is marked by private prayers, from sundown the night before.

Mardi Gras/Shrove Tuesday

The last day for Catholics before the long fast for Lent begins. The occasion is referred to as Mardi Gras in parts of the world including Europe and South America. In England, it is known as Pancake Tuesday. Mardi Gras is famously celebrated around world by dressing in costumes and masks during street parades.

### Feb 2nd Christian Candlemas

Celebrating the presentation of Jesus; Jesus' first entry into the temple and Virgin Mary's purification. A candle-lit procession leads the mass in many Churches around the world. Celebratory customs vary, depending on location.

### Feb 8th - 10th Buddhist Losar

The Tibetan Buddhist New Year. The holiday is based on the lunar calendar and is a time of renewal through spiritual practices and rituals of gratitude.

### Feb 14th U. S, U.K. and Canada St. Valentine's Day

Holiday honouring the martyrdom the saint Valentine, or Valentinus. Typically associated with romantic love. St. Valentine's Day was recognized as a day of romance, in the 14th century.

### Feb 24th Hindu Maghi-Purnima

Magha is the name for February in Hindu culture. It is the month of good deeds and charity.

Maghi-Purnima is a Hindu festival in worship of Lord

Vishnu, protector of the universe.

Millions of devotees take a holy bath in the Ganga carry out charity work throughout the month.

### Feb 24th Buddhism Magha Puja

This Buddhist holiday celebrates a time when 1,250 enlightened Buddhist monks, ordained by the Buddha came to see the Buddha without being summoned on the night of the full moon of the third lunar month. Traditionally. the Three Jewels of Buddhism: the Buddha, the Sangha and the Dharma are honoured on this day

### Feb 24th Chinese Lantern Festival

Also known as Shangyuan, the light festival signifies the final day of the Chinese New Year. It is typically a celebration in Thailand, Indonesia and Singapore. Paper lanterns are usually released into the night sky.

### February 24-25th Islam Shab-e-Barat

A "Night of Forgiveness" during the month of Shaban in the Islamic faith. It is a night dedicated to prayer.

### Feb 26 - 29th Baha'i Ayyám-i-Há

Ayyám-i-Há is the addition of 4 days to the Baha'i solar calendar. Members of the faith begin a 19 day fast to welcome in the new year.
